# P.E. and Sport Premium Funding Report - Summer 2021

For the academic year September 2020 to July 2021 the school will receive £19,530 in Sport Premium Funding.

We must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of Physical Education, Sport and Physical Activity (PESPA) on offer to pupils.

This means we will use the premium to:

- 1. To develop or add to the PeSSPA already in place in school (referring to the aims below)
- 2. To make improvements now for future pupils

The 5 key indicators where improvements should be seen are:

- 1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity, aiming for 30 minutes a day within school time.
- 2. The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.
- 3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport.

The National Curriculum aims are for all children:

- To be physically active, working towards a target of 30 minutes activity during and after the school day (excluding general play times)
- To excel in a broad range of activities
- To engage in competition
- To lead healthy lifestyles





We aim to do meet the curriculum expectations with the help of the Sport Premium Funding by providing:

- A more inclusive curriculum
- A growth in traditional and alternative sports
- Improvements in our partnership work with other schools
- Creating links with other subjects that contribute to pupils' overall achievement and their greater social, spiritual, moral and cultural skills

# Key achievements in academic Year 2020-2021:

- Achieved the School Games Gold Sports Mark for the fourth year running (given automatically due to Covid-19)
- Took part in 12 virtual competitions ensuring there were inclusive opportunities for all
- Competed in 7 different types of sports/activities involving numerous competitions
- Ensured Years 1-6 took part in a competition, involving 348 pupils out of 409: 85% of the school
- Catered for and involved every group within competitions:
  - @ 100% of Less-Active children
  - @ 81% of SEND children
  - @ 80% SEND INCLUSIVE children
  - @ 85% of BAME children
  - @ 82% of FAL children
- Created and maintained links with 5 local sports clubs
- Provided Year 2 (Street Dance), Year 3 (Tennis and Squash). Year 4 (Cricket). Year 5 (Cricket and Tennis) and Year 6 (Zumba, Tennis and Squash) with a specialist coach to enhance their PE curriculum
- A lunchtime leader was employed to provide activities for all KS2 year groups
- Pupil Premium pupils were able to attend after school sports
- A Moving in May competition was set up with the children totaling a distance of nearly 10,000km.
- 9 Wellbeing Ambassadors set up a number of competitions and led many events with pupils from all year groups.

- Develop the PSHE link with PE and ensure the key skills for both are being taught
- Develop activities to be a fully established 'active school'
